the rest of their life and due to circumstances, most of these things can be governed by laws of the Legislature.

THE CHAIRMAN: Let me request we not discuss the school age question any more.

Mr. Clagett?

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MR. CLAGETT: I can't skip the impression, and
I would like to have it clarified, Mrs. Freedlander,
whether the gist of your dissent here wouldn't be a
matter for consideration by the Committee on Style?

MRS. FREEDLANDER: No.

THE CHAIRMAN: I would answer it goes beyond the mere matter of style. I think the type of change recommended by Mrs. Freedlander is greater than the Committee on Style would feel free to attempt.

MR. CLACETT: Then I would ask Mrs. Bothe if she hasn't refused the principle that the Commission is trying to follow, short, concise, direct expression.

MRS. BOTHE: Perhaps we have, but then I think if we are going to have an education article at all that we are going to have to allow for some latitude in this area because other than Section 2 which is a mandatory
