provision everything pertaining to education is in the way of an exhortation. Now, we have had in the Declaration of Rights a statement in Section 43. We felt that it was important that the State of Maryland symbolically recognize its obligations to support education on a broad front and that there was no other way to do it but through an exhortatory passage such as the one here. We feel it will have some explicit effect because it will be possible in the Legislature for people to point to the language of Section 1 and say that the Constitution demands that the Legislature and the General Assembly extend itself in support of education insofar as the

times warrant and the budget warrants.

MR. SCANLAN: I think the debate is whether we exhort in one section or exhort in two sections and on that issue of this, Mrs. Freedlander has the advantage of both terseness and lucidity.

MRS. BOTHE: I think perhaps we will have to discuss Sections 1 and 2 together since Mrs. Freedlander's dissent does go to the question of whether they should be
