discussion?

DR. BARD: I would recommend that we discuss this in its two parts, Mr. Chairman. What we do until the 1970 census is considered which would mean up to the election of 1974, and then after that the last sentence in that recommendation deals with --

THE CHAIRMAN: The question will arise on the approval of the first sentence of the recommendation, that the number of members shall be as prescribed by law and until reapportionment under the 1970 census, number of delegates shall not exceed 142 and number of Senators shall not exceed 43. Ready for the question? All those in favor signify by saying aye, contrary, no. So ordered.

Now the next question arises on the second sentence that after reapportionment following the 1970 census, the number of Senators shall be not more than 43 and number of Delegates not more than 150.

MR. CLAGETT: Why is it necessary to make any provision for the increase?
