MRS. BOTHE: 28,000 students, many of whom are engaged in graduate work. It is the State's major research army and moreover, its effect goes way beyond the boundaries of the State. It is largely supported by Federal monies which require that the University be able to handle them without undue interference from State officials. The concept of autonomy for the State University and I might say, first of all, that the majority of State Constitutions give some recognition to their State University. I think

Maryland, as you know, gives no recognition whatever in the present Constitution to any form of education beyond the public schools or the secondary schools. There is nothing very novel and something rather backward, we conclude, in Maryland's failure in its Constitution to give any specific recognition to its State University. The concept of autonomy being attached to the State University is also not new. We cannot say that too many States have embraced it. However, it seems to me the coming thing. It is a little hard also to say how
