2               We do not feel that the budget people whom  
3 Mr. Case was very fond of, should have the right to deter-  
4 mine what teachers should be paid and how much teachers  
5 should be in what area, what a particular building should  
6 be used for, or how their layouts should be constructed.  
7 We feel this is so much a matter of expertise in an  
8 area in which the budgetary system is less able to  
9 cope and which the University is well able to cope with,  
10 that it ought to be afforded constitutional sanction and  
11 that the University ought to be guaranteed that it will  
12 not suffer undue interference from the State.

13               The University has had the experience of auton-  
14 omy since 1952 and as far as we were able to discover, it  
15 has not resulted in any disorder, it has not resulted in  
16 any misappropriation or misuse of funds. To the contrary,  
17 it has enabled the University to develop freely and to  
18 grow in a manner which we feel it could not, if it were  
19 constantly the subject of interference by officials of the  
20 State. We think it should be kept in mind that actually  
21 the need for autonomy is one which the Government created
