rather than the University. As we understand it, the University had autonomy. It is a land grant college and was ruled by its Board of Regents and this predated the Budget Bureau and the tremendous growth of centralized bureaucratic services. What we are seeking to do, in effect, is to get back to the University or to guarantee to it what it traditionally has had during the 150 years of its existence.

We feel that this is an extremely important measure to be taken by the Constitutional Convention.

Mr. Case has been a Member of the Board of Regents, is perhaps much more familiar with the inside workings of the statutory autonomy, and we were treated to a number of examples of the necessity for it. For instance, I think one example that Mr. Case will recite involves some intricate research machinery that there was a conflict as to nobody who knew how to work it, did they?

MR. CASE: No.

MRS. BOTHE: And an issue arose as to whether the experts at the University should decide what kind of machinery to purchase. So we don't think this is the kind
