

1 of the Constitution or with the other powers of govern-  
2 ment. We are not suggesting, for instance, that if a  
3 student on the campus at the University of Maryland com-  
4 mits a crime that only these powers that be are the  
5 University and should try and punish him for it. We are  
6 merely speaking of the operation of the University per  
7 se, and I don't see that there is any conflict between  
8 our proposal and those of the Government and the various  
9 civil subdivisions of the State.

10 MR. MILLER: Along the line Mr. Clagett was  
11 saying, this being in the Constitution, you do not feel  
12 it would carry police powers with it?

13 MRS. BOTHE: No.

14 MR. MILLER: Why not?

15 MRS. BOTHE: The powers granted are general  
16 supervision of the institution and control of the expen-  
17 ditures. It has nothing to do with the general civil law.  
18 They are not creating a separate state. They are creating  
19 an institution which is given certain constitutional  
20 powers as is done in many other parts of the Constitution.
