I realize and believe it is true that there are only four States who have elevated their universities to constitutional status. They are California -- and California has shown that one does not escape the vicissitudes of politics. In the words of Thurman Arnold, you can never take the politics out of politics. The other universities that are elevated to constitutional status are Minnesota, Michigan and Georgia. I would be one of those who contest the proposition that the University of Georgia is a first rate institution, constitutional autonomy or not.

The statutory autonomy under which the University of Maryland has flourished has worked well. Certainly, it is always a risk that a Legislature of the future might repeal it, amend it or jettison it altogether, but again, that is one of the risks of democracy. If every institution or agency in this State that was afraid that at sometime a Legislature would act arbitrarily or capriciously and therefore demand constitutional protection, we would have a document 100 pages long. I have seen no
