I think this should be in the Constitution first to make it permanent and not subject to the vicis-situdes of political or personal fortune, and second, that it expresses a basic policy, the will of the people that the University should maintain this autonomy as defined at this point.

THE CHAIRMAN: Further debate?

Mr. Miller?

MR. MILLER: Mr. Chairman, and Members of the Commission, let me start out by saying that I have a great sentimental attachment and regard for the University of Maryland, although I was not an undergraduate there. My son was, though, and there is a lot of sentiment in my

family because when the college moved to College Park, according to their records, my great-grandfather was its first President; and at that time it had 100 or so acres of land at College Park, and its faculty consisted of

three professors and its student body was less than 300.

It has not been in the Constitution, and it has prospered, and we are proud of it. But it seems to me we are getting far away from the original goal of this Commission, which
