1 THE CHAIRMAN:

DR. BARD: Recently the State of Maryland set forth a concept known as the tripartite system of higher education. It made it clear that each segment of that tripartite system was intricately tied together and that if one portion of that segment were separated from the other two portions, all three would fall apart.

Dr. Bard?

It seems to me that to take one segment of the system and to set it apart is to destroy the whole concept of the tripartite arrangement which I think is basic to the progress of higher education in Maryland. Some of the arguments that were set forth in regard to the needs at the University of Maryland hold equally true, if not more so, for at least one other segment of this tripartite arrangement in terms of the budgetary necessity and so forth, and in terms I might say, of enrollment and growth for this clear illustration. Let me say that over 33,000 students will be enrolled in the public State colleges.

My point is that it is highly important that we not separate one segment of the tripartite arrangement and call attention to it in the Constitution and leave
