

1 speak not for the University and indeed, it is because of
2 the growing nature of autonomy that I can speak, perhaps,
3 only for myself. I would like to broaden this discussion
4 a bit by point out that in the letter which has been
5 given to us addressed to Mr. Eney by Dr. Elkins on the
6 6th of August, and which I read for the first time last
7 night, on Page 3, the second new paragraph, Dr. Elkins
8 discusses what I profoundly believe is true.

9 He opens it by saying the public university is
10 not just another State agency. It must teach and extend
11 knowledge to the people by appropriate search, must pro-
12 vide an open quorum and must have the freedom to learn
13 what is to learn.

14 Now, I would like to speak as an individual and
15 looking from the faculty point of view. Here we are on
16 the cutting edge. We have talked about business this
17 morning, I think, more than faculty members would ordinarily
18 be likely to do. Let me talk about the other angle of it.
