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of leaving it to the legislative wisdom and court decision. There seems to be the advantage of having definite guide lines and standards especially as these are beginning to evolve.

MRS. BOTHE: I agree but in view of the restrictions placed since this subject first arose, I don't think it is necessary any longer.

THE CHAIRMAN: Judge Adkins, as I understand your suggestion, I would like you to put it in the form of a motion so we can act on it. It would be in effect that you would say districts should be as nearly equal as may be in population leaving out the phrase so that there should not be a variation in the population of each district of more than 5 per cent from the mean, is that correct?

JUDGE ADKINS: I wouldn't undertake to prescribe specific language. Have to be sufficiently equal to be constitutionally acceptable.

THE CHAIRMAN: I am not trying to get the language of the constitution but just the principle.

You want general language that they be as nearly equal
