actually be affected. I see you have got an appendix containing a list of what I assume to be all of the offices you could think that would come under this revised provision and it is a little difficult on taking a hasty glance at it to know just how widespread on an immediate practical basis the change would be. For instance, I don't believe you indicate, maybe you do, the length of terms of the various boards now.

JUDGE ADKINS: We do not. It is a little difficult to answer your question because of the fact that I don't know how many principal departments the ultimate reorganization statute will result in. That is a matter, as I said earlier, that is now under study. The intent of this is to give the Governor the right to appoint and to discharge at will the heads of the principal departments. How many of those principal departments there will be, I can't answer. It is not our intent that he should be able to go below the chief executive officer of each of the principal departments. Now I would guess unquestionably there would be perhaps health, perhaps law enforcement, and
