MR. MARTINEAU: I don't quite understand why since you are permitting the Governor to, I think, obtain control over all of the boards or commissions, why you also have to give the Governor the power to appoint a chief administrative officer operating under these boards and commissions. It seems to me that the control is enough and that like take, for example, the executive secretary of the State Racing Commission. I frankly can't understand why he should have to be appointed by the Governor. He has to work directly with and directly under the State Racing Commission and his functions are not policy making functions. They are merely administrative. I think it would be much more important to have him operate closely with the Commission appointed by the Governor than be somehow able to get along with the Governor. I frankly don't like it.

JUDGE ADKINS: The State Racing Commission is a problem, I will concede. To begin with, I don't know and I don't think we have been able to determine whether it is a regulatory quasi-judicial agency or
