differ in any respect from a number of other Commissions or organizations. I agree with Mr. Bond that the educational system might not be one to particularly single out in this respect. But it seems to me that the Committee has proceeded on a theory which might be a tremendous mass of practice and unless there is better evidence, particularly as pertains to certain agencies, I am thinking of the Board of Regents of the University of Maryland, which is appointed, there are eleven members who receive appointments for seven years. Under this proposal, the terms of those members would have to be revamped so that 50 per cent of the membership expired every four years. I am sure there are a number of other examples where a well functioning system, and nobody here today is questioning that the Board of Regents at the University of Maryland has been functioning well under its present tenure and method of appointment, this would be completely out the window by virtue of the new theory which the Committee on the Executive Department prescribes and I am sure that there are a number of other examples similarly.
