2 DR. BARD: How else would you say it?

3 MR. SCANLON: I would say a plan of congressional
4 districting and legislative apportionment. You are using
5 the word, district, now, in a different sense and it's em-
6 braced in the larger function of apportionment. When you
7 apportion the Legislature, naturally, you have to have dis-
8 tricts, but to talk about that in the same sense you are
9 talking about congressional redistricting, I think, is con-
10 fusing.

11 Maybe I've been too close to this and --

12 THE CHAIRMAN: Could you meet both objections if
13 you said, it's a little more cumbersome, A plan of congres-
14 sional districting and legislative districting or apportion-
15 ment?

16 MR. MARTINEAU: Or legislative apportionment and
17 districting.

18 MR. CLAGETT: Couldn't you simply say, A plan
19 of congressional and legislative districting and apportion-
20 ment of the General Assembly?
