THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Martineau.

MR. MARTINEAU: Doctor, is it your thought that if there is an independent who is to be replaced that the Governor could pick a person of any Party?

DR. BARD: This was our Committee feeling, that the Governor had a perfect right to pick a person of any Party or an independent, if he so desired, if a vacancy by an independent occurred.

MR. MARTINEAU: My recollection was, and it might be totally incorrect, that we voted last time to provide that the independent was to be succeeded by an independent.

Maybe my recollection is wrong.

DR. BARD: I don't think you are right on that.

THE CHAIRMAN: I won't be positive, but my recollection of the discussion was that if the vacancy occurred as a result of the resignation and death of a person who was a Member of a Party, he had to be succeeded by a Member of that Party, but I did not understand that the Governor would have to pick an independent to succeed an independent. Mr. Hoff?

MR. HOFF: Did we not decide that the Members
