the Legislature had the subpoens power. Mr. Case made the emphatic statement that he thought it did. I think Senator Hoff had a question in his mind as to whether the power existed and as to whether the Legislative Council had the power.

In any event, the one definitive action that the Commission did take was to request that that point be reserved and that a memorandum be prepared on the power of the Legislature to make investigations, compel appearance of witnesses and so forth.
