1 Constitution?

THE CHAIRMAN: I think it just refers to officers being impeached. It doesn't, as I recall, confer the express power.

MR. SYKES: There's a big change. In Section

26 of Article 3, on Page 22, which says, The House of Delegates shall have the sole power of impeachment in all cases. Now, in the present text, we have in all cases, Provided by law, and that would indicate to me that nobody has any impeaching power in the State Government under this new provision, unless a law has been passed by the Legislature stating who is subject to impeachment, and I think the solution would be to do the same thing that the old Constitution did. There is an inherent impeachment power and impeachment is a kind of common law doctrine going way back and you can just strike out, Provided by law, and

eliminate the problem. I would so move.
