boards and agencies, but our Committee feels that this would be very incorrect procedure and bad as a matter of substance, and we feel that the Constitution ought to make it perfectly clear that only the elected representatives of the people carry the right to impose tax.

Therefore, the new Article 14 will be found on Page 2 as recommended by the Committee, at least which says in a little more modern language that, No tax shall be imposed except for a public purpose and except by the elected representatives of the people.

The, public purpose, wording apparently is implied in the Court decisions which have construed present Article 14, but we felt that this ties in nicely with the use of that phrase, so far as the borrowing capacity is concerned in Section 34 of Article 3 which the Commission has already considered.

So that, Mr. Chairman, is -- I don't know whether you want to take action on these as we go along.

THE CHAIRMAN: Dr. Burdette?

DR. BURDETTE: A question, Mr. Chairman, about the elected representatives of the people. That
