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We are not at this time getting into the question of what extent the Governor should have the right to hire and fire top policy making officers. That will follow in a subsequent report. It will, however, generally follow the basic policy as set forth in the introduction. We are in sympathy with the philosophy as set forth by Governor Tawes in his message to the Legislature on March 22. We have set forth in the introduction the seven guidelines which he there proposed.

With that general introduction, we can get to the meat of the report. There are, as you know, a number of Constitutional officers provided for the Executive Branch. We will take them up in this report item by item, but suffice it to say by way of summary we are recommending that there be only two Constitutional officers for the Executive Branch, to wit, the Governor and a newly created post of Lieutenant Governor. The necessary correlary to this is that we are recommending the abolition as a Constitutional officer of the office of Comptroller, the office of Attorney General, the office of Treasurer, the office of State Librarian, and
