will strike the whole phrase, with respect to taxes on property, so the Section would read, and such classes may include such property devoted to agricultural and open space use.

Dr. Burdette?

DR. BURDETTE: I have a related question. I don't know what would happen if somebody wanted to argue, if it were brought up that this language coming, and such classes may include such property devoted to agricultural or open space use, if the argument were directed to the view that agricultural use and open space use must be in the other classes. I think the language can be so read. It is certainly not intended. Much of my commentary here comes from my observation that courts get new meanings of land as years go by.

THE CHAIRMAN: I don't follow your question at all, Dr. Burdette.

DR. BURDETTE: I gather the intent of the Committee and the Commission is that there may be classification for agricultural use or for open space use.

THE CHAIRMAN: Right.
