

1 DR. BURDETTE: The language actually says,
2 such classes. Now, these are the classes already men-
3 tioned, I suppose. Such, carries that, may include
4 property devoted, so this property may be put in the
5 other class which, of course, on its face is redundancy.

6 THE CHAIRMAN: Is your suggestion that the word
7 should be, classification, instead of, classes?

8 DR. BURDETTE: Well, yes, such classification,
9 would help it. My own language, I am not competent to
10 draft the technical language.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: Isn't the question one of
12 style rather than substance?

13 DR. BURDETTE: Yes, it is, but still/^{very quickly}gets over
14 the change of meaning. I don't think Mr. Case follows
15 what I am speaking about.

16 MR. CASE: You have lost me, Professor.

17 THE CHAIRMAN: I think the substance of what
18 you say could be met by the use of the word, classifica-
19 tion, instead of, classes, and I don't imagine the
20 Chairman of the Committee would have any objection to
