DR. BURDETTE: The language actually says, 1 such classes. Now, these are the classes already men-2 tioned, I suppose. Such, carries that, may include 3 property devoted, so this property may be put in the 4 other class which, of course, on its face is redundancy. 5 THE CHAIRMAN: Is your suggestion that the word 6 should be, classification, instead of, classes? 7 DR. BURDETTE: Well, yes, such classification, 8 would help it. My own language, I am not competent to 9 draft the technical language. 10 THE CHAIRMAN: Isn't the question one of 11 style rather than substance? 12 very quickly DR. BURDETTE: Yes, it is, but still/gets over 13 the change of meaning. I don't think Mr. Case follows 14 what I am speaking about. 15 MR. CASE: You have lost me, Professor. 16 THE CHAIRMAN: I think the substance of what 17 you say could be met by the use of the word, classifica-18 tion, instead of, classes, and I don't imagine the 19 Chairman of the Committee would have any objection to 20 that.
