4 MR. CASE: Not sixty, but there are some.

5 MRS. BOTHE: How many?

6 MR. CASE: About a half dozen.

7 DR. BARD: Can I ask a question, Mr. Case?

8 There would be no problem, for example, in respect to  
9 exemptions of persons because of their age and property  
10 and wealth?

11 MR. CASE: That would be as classification.

12 DR. BARD: Just wanted to know.

13 MR. CASE: Article III, the lottery. That  
14 starts on Page 25. It is happy for me that we can get  
15 into a broad plateau here of philosophical concepts  
16 rather than just whether you are going to express some-  
17 thing one way or the other. Here we are talking about the  
18 lottery because Article III says that no lottery grant  
19 shall ever hereafter be authorized by the General Assem-  
20 bly. This raises the question of whether or not you  
21 want your Constitution to prohibit a lottery. Very
