briefly, the background on lotteries is simply this: Lotteries are as ancient as most anything you can really think about that have been brought forward into modern day living. Historians say the lottery was first begun in Italy and a great many of the public buildings at that time, the canals, and so on, were financed in that country by the lottery. In England in the early 17th Century, lotteries became very fashionable with the people who particularly, the merchants who sold their goods through lotteries, and the East India Company was well recognized in this area until the Crown decided that one of the things that could perhaps finance the improvement of the various harbors there was to get a cut out of these lotteries. So they did exactly that. In this country, the concept of the lottery has been thought to have been an antecedent of the ones I have just mentioned, and it is very interesting to note the great amount of public finance that was done in the early period of time in our country through the lottery.

Now, our Committee held a hearing with respect to whether or not this provision should be retained, and
