

1 as well as to the giving or issuing of lottery/grants.
2 The principal witness at our hearing, I guess everybody
3 knows who that was, who came complete with television
4 cameras from three stations, to wit, Mr. Hyman Pressman,
5 argued with some degree of persuasiveness, I thought,
6 that the word, lottery grant, did not proscribe the
7 State, and indeed, the State could at any time conduct a
8 lottery under the present Constitution. But he strongly
9 suggested that this matter was not one of constitutional
10 dimension, and that the question of whether or not there
11 should be a lottery in the State and run by the State
12 as a way or method of gaining revenues for the State
13 should in the last analysis be left to the Legislature
14 and should, therefore, be removed as an absolute pro-
15 hibition from the Constitution.

16 Now, there is just no question about the fact
17 that a lottery is a substitute or a method of financing
18 government. It is something that is evasive as anything
19 can be, and really it is for this reason that I think
20 every man on the Committee opposes a lottery and the
21 recommendation that is being made here does not mean to
