that four out of five of those who could less afford to gamble bought the tickets. Because of its propinquity and relatively large population, Massachusetts buys more New He upshire lottery tickets and has more winners than any other State.

Third, the cost⁵ of collecting net revenues from the lottery are very high compared to most types of taxes. In addition to enticing amounts of prize money, there is the special factor of expensive administration in an activity noted for its appeal to the underworld.

Four, net revenues could be expected to increase during recession and decrease during recovery because of the desire to gamble during rate of high unemployment. It may be concluded that the lottery is in the broadest sense an inefficient means of raising public revenues.

Our Committee developed all of these facts and the facts that appear in the Report, and the mafter I have just read to you does not appear in the Report, but I think it is instructive and interesting and should be brought to your attention, but it concluded neverthe-
