

1 They can both go in the same direction, but they are
2 not exactly alike.

3 DR. JENKINS: Does that mean Yes or No?

4 MR. CASE: In my business, that means neither.

5 MR. MILLER: Isn't a lottery fundamentally
6 a voluntary thing? You couldn't pass a law making it
7 voluntary.

8 MR. CASE: That is right.

9 MR. MINDEL: We ought to be very careful on
10 this. If this comes out, the public is going to
11 erroneously think this Commission favors a lottery, and I
12 think we have to be careful about any statements issued.
13 I think the average person might get the wrong impres-
14 sion. If this Commission comes out and says we favor
15 the elimination of this provision, then we might be favor-
16 ing a lottery and Mr. Case clearly explained we were not.

17 MR. HOFF: Someone might wish to make political
18 hay out of this, too.

19 THE CHAIRMAN: I take it what the Committee is
20 saying is that they are expressing no opinion on the
21 broad moral question, if you want to call it a moral
