They can both go in the same direction, but they are not exactly alike.

DR. JENKINS: Does that mean Yes or No?

MR. CASE: In my business, that means neither.

Isn't a lottery fundamentally MR. MILLER: a voluntary thing? You couldn't pass a law making it voluntary.

> MR. CASE: That is right. MR. MINDEL: We ought to be very careful on

If this comes out, the public is going to erroneously think this Commission favors a lottery, and I think we have to be careful about any statements issued. I think the average person might get the wrong impres-If this Commission comes out and says we favor the elimination of this provision, then we might be favoring a lottery and Mr. Case clearly explained we were not. Someone might wish to make political
