uttered one hundred years ago, I think they conceivably could have been said yesterday. Mr. Sachs wants me to read these, and I would like to, but I know time is getting ahead of us here. They are great words. Actually, Ladies and Gentlemen, the question of sites in tax matters is a legislative rathan than a constitutional problem. In Article 18, I think it is Section 8 or 9, now controls the status of where property shall be taxed and there have been changes in these concepts through the years. The protection that people have in this regard is, of course, a fundamental protection of due process and equal protection of the laws which are carried in other broader language than dealing specifically with tax or tax matters. We therefore recommend that the material on Page 29 be eliminated. THE CHAIRMAN: Any questions? Any comment?

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If not, we will move on to the next, which I think is the final recommendation.

MR. CASE: The final recommendation is that the State shall pass no law providing for payment by this

State for slaves, et cetera, and I think that needs no
