even greater impetus to the idea that they should not have even a measure of control over the institution.

Therefore, although I am reluctant and concerned very much about the effect of the double provision, I will vote for the motion.

Any further discussion? Dr. Bard, will you

DR. BARD: I have but this statement to make,
Mr. Chairman. First, I agree very strongly with your
last statement, namely, to leave out the State colleges
from this Constitution, no matter how you may feel in
regard to the first motion which we have just passed, it
would do serious damage to the growth of the State colleges
at this time particularly. Most State Constitutions

that deal with higher education include both elements,

the University and the State colleges. To leave them out

Secondly, it is important for us to recognize
that the tripartite system of higher education is beginning to be deeply recognized in the State of Maryland as
in
it has/so many States throughout the country, and this is
