primarily for the use of the Constitutional Convention, as to our reasons for recommending or not recommending certain things. This is one of the most important matters on which we will make a recommendation. We are drafting both the provisions, that is, for bicameral as well as unicameral legislation, recognizing it is a matter of considerable doubt or a matter of which there is considerable controversy, and we should have something more than a mere vote.

MRS. FREEDLANDER: A point of information.

In order to get unicameralism on the floor, would an amendment to the motion be in order that the Commission recommend a unicameral Legislature?

THE CHAIRMAN: I don't think it is necessary.

I think you can tell by the vote on this. It is a very narrow issue.

Mr. Bond?

MR. BOND: Wasn't there a considerable discussion of this point at Easton?

THE CHAIRMAN: Not the discussion, but whether the Commission should recommend one or the other. There
