back perhaps to the arguments at the time of the formation of our own country when they weren't confronted with these problems of mass legislation and were looking at it more in the abstract, and it seems to me that the arguments, then, in favor of bicameralism outweighed to some extent the arguments in favor of unicameralism.

I think it is awfully close and myself, personally my view might change completely after the next session of the Legislature, because that is the first session of the Legislature when they are going to have one man, one vote principle in at least one House, although I think as Judge Adkins observed, we don't have exactly one man and one vote in both Houses. I don't think the two of them are necessarily equal. In any event, I think that the question is an important one and if the scales in my mind were decidedly in favor of unicameralism, I would unhesitantly vote in that way. They are in a state of imbalance, but weigh slightly in the way of bicameralism. That is the way I will vote.
