

1 MR. CLAGETT: Measure of built-in referendum.

2 MR. SYKES: What is the theory of requiring
3 where more than three but less than all do it, but not
4 requiring it when all of them are changed?

5 MR. CLAGETT: If the Legislature is going to
6 tamper with the change of boundary lines, then we want
7 a restriction. If it is going to do a clean sweep job,
8 we want them to have the degree of flexibility that
9 seems to be the whole design and purpose of a new Con-
10 stitution.

11 THE CHAIRMAN: I take it that one of the
12 thoughts you had in mind is if the Legislature wanted
13 to abolish all Counties and create five or ten larger
14 units, this would not require any referendum?

15 MR. CLAGETT: That is correct.

18 Counties? Will that require two referendums? In other
19 words, do the people concerned have to approve it and
20 also the State as a whole approve it?
