MR. SAYRE: Under the present Constitution, 1 but under our Section at present all we submit is a 2 petition. I mean, under our present draft, don't we 3 4 allow both ways? THE CHAIRMAN: We don't say anything about 5 referendum except by petition. 6 MR. CASE: Mr. Chairman --7 MR. CLAGETT: Mr. Chairman, I might suggest 8 the position of the Committee. We spent hours debating 9 the pros and cons, and you can still spend hours ending 10 up where you started from. The idea was to give the 11 General Assembly a degree of flexibility in order to 12 alter the boundaries of all the Counties, and if ultim-13 ately the time comes that the Counties should be dissolved 14 and areas or regional redsitricting are brought into 15 play, then the General Assembly should have that degree 16 of flexibility and be subject only to a State wide per-17 missive referendum. But something short of that should 18 give to the areas that are affected a degree of protec-19 tion, and this represents a compromise that was arrived 20 at with great, great difficulty; and I suggest that we 21
