rather than to have any kind of referendum vote which will always nullify the present existing arrangements.

DR. JENKINS: Mr. Chairman, I am very much concerned by the question brought up by Mr. Hargrove, and this has not been discussed, and that is who protects the rest of the County when a particular area may wish to secede. We may find situations throughout the State where an affluent part of a subdivision may want to, for various reasons, to go with another subdivision, thus impoverishing the balance of the County. I think at this moment I am in favor of a State referendum on such. I am not certain of that, but I think I would like that protection on any of these changes.

THE CHAIRMAN: Any further discussion?

DR. BARD: I just want to give an example of the sort of thing that was just offered. Suppose some suburban areas of Baltimore City decided that it would be to their advantage to splinter off and become a part of Baltimore County. How about the rest of the City? Where would it be? The Inner City could then be left with just the inner core itself after a while, and more
