you are going to give the Legislature the power to solve the problem of urbanization in metropolitan government. I don't think that is an exaggeration at all because if the Legislature is not to have the power to change County lines without having a referendum, not only of the people who are being moved, but those in the area into which they are being moved, it seems to me that it is going to be impossible to give the Legislature the power to create any kind of district or regional government in time to cope with the metropolitan problems we are facing today.

Yet it seems to me that these must be solved. Certainly, we are in the situation today where you just cannot possibly solve problems of transportation and zoning and land use and sewers and such in this tremendous swath of urban community that will extend from the Pennsylvania line unless the Legislature has the power not to ask the political subdivisions how they want to handle it, but to decide how it is going to handle it. This gives the Legislature a tremendous amount of power, but it seems to me anything less is simply not going
