DR. JENKINS: Excuse me, Hal, you say about the portion being moved. But what about that portion that is not being moved?

MR. CLAGETT: Either a part of the State as a whole, and if they are that much affected, they can exercise their voice in the State wide referendum.

Again, remember, this is a compromise, and you can really find -- well, we came up with four separate possibilities and you can get into about twelve.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mrs. Bothe?

MRS. EOTHE: It seems to me there is really no way to have a referendum that would be effective, that is, a compromise referendum that has a place in the second paragraph. I don't think there is any means of providing for a referendum that is going to carry out the purpose. Either you are going to have the Legislature with a free hand subject to the permissive referendum, or you are going to have a situation where the County, the people involved themselves are going to have to determine whether they are going to be moved, which means,
