I think, we will never have any new Counties, and I think the Commission is going to have to decide which principle is more important rather than fool around with how we can have a referendum that is fair, because I know the Committee has spent hours on this, and apparently hasn't come up with one, and I don't really see where a proper referendum, built-in referendum, could be formulated.

THE CHAIRMAN: Mr. Haile?

MR. HAILE: I would like to point out that Counties are older than the States or the cities, and these waters run deep; and just eighteen years ago there was an amendment to the Constitution preventing large areas from gobbling up small Counties which passed the referendum. I think that we should continue that and resort to regional governments as we are proposing in later legislation, and let the old Counties with their school systems and judicial circuits stay as they are. That I would like to point out to the Commission.
