to me that we can't still have the tools through interregional governments and intergovernmental authorities,
and still continue the safeguards that the present Constitution gives to the people.

MR. CLAGETT: Mr. Chairman, I want it to be clear that if the motion fails, consideration of the thought of Mr. Sykes that the whole paragraph can be deleted will still equally remain open for consideration.

THE CHAIRMAN: Essentially the paragraph will still be before the Commission, either in its present or amended form.

MR. DELLA: I think there is another way to reach the solution to the problem which we are trying to solve. I am not sure of the mechanics, but I know New Jersey, for instance, has one County adjoining the other with boroughs and everything else interlocking. You have people living on one side of the street who live in one County, and the others live in another. The water, transportation, and everything else is handled by one authority. I don't see why something can't be worked out here.
