night, and then this Report that I am reading to you now, I read while Mr. Case was giving his Report this morning.

So it has a degree of originality. When we hit that one phrase there, it involves this business of regional

governments, et cetera, and when we get to that, I daresay we will be here until tomorrow. It is all very

interesting, but somewhere you are going to have to

resolve these things as we did and notwithstanding the good suggestions we got from our worthy Chairman, we had

a variety in some respects as you will see later. Now, let's move on into Subsection (d), because

here is another big area of controversy and one where we debated long and strenuously. Counties, classes of Counties -- based upon population as determined by the most recent United States census may be provided by law with not more than five classes and not less than three Counties in any one class. No more than one classification shall be in effect at any one time, but the classifications may be changed at any time.

Now, here again, the Committee is seeking to
