early that it was going to accomplish the removal of the General Assembly from the field of local legislation. Now, in accomplishing that, you have still got to keep an eye upon the degree of flexibility on the part of the General Assembly to take care of areas of conflict. In order to be sure that it didn't classify into 24 different classes, we put a restriction upon the number of classes, and we debated what that should be, and finally determined that it should be not more than five classes, and then in order that there be imposed upon the General Assembly a degree of serious considerations, we provided that there should be not less than three Counties in any one class.

MR. SCANLAN: Hal, may I ask a question? I can see why you did that, but you say not less than three Counties in any one class. There could come a time when you have five or six Counties of roughly the same, say smaller population. Why would you have to divide that into two classes? I suppose your answer is that --

MR. CLAGETT: There shall be not less than three Counties in any one class, but there shall be not
