

1 Classification A, let us say, and if Baltimore City
2 wanted to, as it is doing right now in particular areas
3 of human relations, let's take such enactments as though
4 concerned with the law practice, it couldn't do because
5 the General Assembly had already arranged for all the
6 Counties in that particular category, and therefore
7 Baltimore City would have lost its opportunity.

8 MR. CLAGETT: Not necessarily.

9 MRS. FREEDLANDER: Each of the Counties, each
10 of the constituent units under each of their charters
11 could still function. We are talking about here the
12 General Assembly cannot legislate in these areas.
13 Baltimore City, within its Charter and within its ordi-
14 nances, could do all these things.

15 DR. BARD: Except in one case. I understand
16 you perfectly, Mrs. Freedlander, except in those cases
17 where, if you read (a) is applicable to all Counties --
18 or to all Counties of its class. It could not function
19 if laws had been passed.

20 MRS. FREEDLANDER: The charter takes precedence
21 here. It says, not denied to it by its charter, or by
