the effect of a new classification would be to dissolve the old.

THE CHAIRMAN: Without getting into language at the moment, I call your attention to the distinction of using the word, classes, in the first instance and classification, in the last, and may still be subject to the problem that you mentioned, but that is more a matter of language than the intent of the Committee.

MR. CLAGETT: It is meant that no one County can be in more than one class at any time. Subsection (c) defines general laws.

Public general laws may be enacted which shall, in their terms and in their effects, apply without exception to all Counties or to all Counties in a class. No County shall be exempt from any public general law. Now, there we define what is meant by a public general law giving it two definitions. All Counties or all Counties in a class, and then we also specifically make clear that no County shall exempt itself or be exempt from public general law.
