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these various Reports on the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, and I don't see any better way of referring back to this full subject than to refer to some of these Reports. Right here the criteria set out on Pages 12 and 14 and A-11, June 1962, I will bypass, but it set forth the full line of criteria we have to consider in this entire Article. Powers needed beyond ordinary territorial limits encompass control over possible threat to health and safety, abatement of nuisances, water

supply, pollution controls, mester plans, regulation of 15 zoning in subdivisions, rail and mass transit, building 16 and so forth. The weakness of City-County intergovern-17 mental agreement and single and/or multi-purpose author-18 ities that they work only when the immediate local interest 19 of each participating unit is thought likely to be in 20 conflict with the broader area-wide interest. 21
