government that are not counties but are between the

county level and the state level, that there must be

a means by which counties, and I always include Baltimore

City when I say "counties," can cooperate to achieve

common objectives in the administration of things such

6 as sewers and transit and so forth.

If the counties do not by cooperation solve their problems at their own level, the matter is of such importance to the state that the state must step in and say "You shall do it this way." Next, and I think every one of us is agreed on this, none of us feels that he is competent to sit down today and work out a draft of a form of regional government that would fit all situations that now exist, that are known to us, and certainly would not fit this situation as it may develop in the future. Finally all of us are agreed also on the principle that what may be a highly desirable form of regional government in the Baltimore City area and the City of Washington, may be most undesirable on the Eastern Shore, in Western Maryland or Southern Maryland and that it is not necessary that we have complete
