by section and if you will keep the three drafts in front of you and keep these two points in mind, I think we can make the policy decisions very promptly. Now one other suggestion and this is going to be a seemingly statement that is inconsistent within itself.

I don't want us to take a lot of time in working out language because none of these drafts are in precisely the form that they are going to be finally because we don't know what the policy decisions are

 going to be.

At the moment I do not want to discourage suggestions for change. As Mr. Clagett pointed out to me, the Committee has been working on this language for a year and the very obvious suggestion made yesterday that incorporated belonged in front of city never occurred to anybody. When you see something like that, flag it, but don't get into any long debate. Now, Mr. Clagett, proceed.

MR. CLACETT: Mr. Chairman, one of the most interesting aspects of this whole article in the Constitution is that it changes from day to day and
