Legislature requires a constitutional majority which is in fact an extraordinary vote of a kind. It is very seldom that all legislatures are present or that there are not either advantacencies as in the legislatures or some of the members are not out attending to other affairs in which case, in fact, there is an extraordinary vote. It requires more than a majority of those present and the requiring more than would seem to really hamper the legislative process.

DR. BURDETTE: I should like to say why I support this motion and perhaps in a direct answer to Mr. Brooks' position. I have never personally lived in a state in which there is such diversity of interests at times in rather small sections. New I run upon the assumption that human nature being what it is, people give more attention to their own immediate interests. I do not live on the Eastern Shore, for example, and to me many of the individual problems of local government on the Eastern Shore are vague and distant. But if, for instance, the changing of county boundaries upon the Eastern Shore would discourage the order of government,
