MR. MITCHELL: I will second it.

MRS. FREEDLANDER: Doesn't that mean a proliferation again? You would have a district over a region.

MR. MARTINEAU: It is a proliferation but it is going to be a narrow one because you will not have that many problems that will transcend the regional problem, the regional government.

MR. SYKES: If you don't do it, you prevent a problem of government from being solved.

MR. SCANLAN: The amendment in my mind confirms the lack of wisdom in the original motion. We are writing a Constitution here, gentlemen, not drafting a text book on sound public administration and Mr. Martineau has added a foot note to your fine paragraph on what should be sound public administration, but I think we should avoid the rigidity of a text book in the Constitution.
